Many schools proudly display awards for cleanliness, academic excellence, or sports performance. Yet, a quiet transformation often goes unnoticed: the shift towards genuinely sustainable habits. When a school decides to reduce its environmental footprint, the real test lies not in a single “cleanliness drive” but in the routines that follow. A corridor free of litter on Inspection Day means little if, on ordinary mornings, dustbins overflow with disposable cups and snack wrappers.

At Horizon Public School, the management introduced a year-long sustainability audit instead of a one-time competition. Students collected data on electricity use, water consumption, and the volume of waste generated in different blocks. The findings were uncomfortable. Classrooms with the most modern equipment often wasted the most energy, and events that celebrated “eco-awareness” produced piles of plastic decorations. Gradually, however, this data became a tool for reflection. Student committees recommended smaller, practical changes, such as shared project materials, limited printing, and the reuse of event banners. The school realised that genuine responsibility meant questioning even its most well-intentioned practices.
