#### A. Ozymandias

- i. Irony: Ozymandias boasts about his great empire, but all that remains are ruins and meaningless fragments, making his glory futile.
- ii. Imagery of "colossal wreck": It shows the decay of once-mighty human achievements and highlights the inevitable decline caused by time.
- iii. Message on pride and ambition: Shelley's poem warns that human pride and ambition are temporary and cannot escape the ravages of time.
- iv. Sonnet structure supporting impermanence: The organized yet broken structure mirrors the rise and fall of Ozymandias's empire, reinforcing the theme of impermanence.

#### B. The Dear Departed (Conversation: Mrs. Jordan & Mrs. Slater)

- i. Mrs. Jordan refers to the family members taking possessions from their father's belongings without consent as 'robbery'.
- ii. Mrs. Slater wants Elizabeth to be quiet to avoid revealing their selfishness and possibly causing conflict.
- iii. The conversation reveals a strained, conflicted relationship between the sisters full of distrust and quarrels.
- iv. The drama uses humor by exaggerating selfishness and greed in family members, highlighting weaknesses in relationships in a comic manner.

#### C. The Frog and the Nightingale

## Option I: Selflessness and Sacrifice in "Two Gentlemen of Verona" and "The Letter"

Nicola and Jacopo in Two Gentlemen of Verona work tirelessly doing odd jobs to afford treatment for their sister, showing selflessness and familial love. Their sacrifices reflect great strength of character as they put others before themselves. Similarly, Coachman Ali in The Letter patiently waits every day hoping for news about his daughter, displaying emotional endurance and quiet suffering. Through their actions, the stories teach the value of altruism and devotion.
